
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In the Gloaming

In the sultry summer twilight of my Southern youth, the 'twixt and 'tween of cartwheels and curling irons, the Bee Gees and Budweiser, I wait. Eyes closed, my body nestled in the cool grass of my neighbor's yard, the smell of gardenias and grilled pork ribs in the air. The Miller girls crouch beside me, slip their fingers underneath my body.

Stiff as a board, light as a feather.

They chant the words, their voices hammy, like a sideshow fortune-teller at the county fair. We believe in magic, but only a little. Less than we did the year before, more than we will the year to come. We believe in communion with the dead. Not the dead rotting in the ground—the dead of legends and myths, sylphs that come to us in our dreams at night, like Casper the Friendly Ghost, and offer mirth and mischief and mystery.

We don't know the torment of the dead, the Heathcliff-and-Cathy angst of lingering and longing, their souls bleak and barren as the Yorkshire moors.

We think we can fly, drifting through fall and winter and spring then back again to summer, like sprites with pigtails and skinned knees.

Stiff as a board, light as a feather.

I'm waiting. For the moment heaven and earth collide and I see past, present, and future, proof my world will never change—my mother, crooning "You Are My Sunshine" while I fall sleep, baking cinnamon rolls on Sunday mornings, hanging Shawn Cassidy posters on my yellow bedroom walls, reciting stories of handsome princes and fairy godmothers and magic pumpkins that never rot and turn to mush. We cannot fathom anything different from here and now, the pungent earth between our bare toes, balmy breeze lilting in our ears—the smells and songs of home.

I hear my mother's voice, tangled in the wind. At first I think she *is* the wind. I open my eyes and see her at the end of the block, a shade in Bermuda shorts and white Keds and the scarf I gave her for Christmas wrapped around her pin-curled hair. I'm not supposed to be out at night. *But it isn't night yet*, I think. The Mercer girls run inside—their own mother beckons through the screen door. Fried chicken and sweet tea await.

I watch my mother trudging toward me, stiff as a board, light as a feather. I hold her gait in my mind's eye, sear it into memory with my childhood, that summer, that moment, in the gloaming, before the streetlights blink on.
